Stream Monitoring Project

Our volunteers can also participate in water quality monitoring. They are provided with test kits and trained to gather baseline data.



- Detect inorganic pollution, gas well leaks, and acid mine discharge
- Count macro-invertebrates to determine a stream's long term health
- Conduct habitat assessments to determine changes to the stream channel and riparian zone

Our stream data is available at our web site for use by all interested citizens, and by government agencies for community planning.

Orphaned Wells Project

We provide volunteers who search for abandoned or "orphaned" oil and gas wells in Oil Creek State Park and other public lands and provide the data to DEP.



An orphaned well, as designated by the DEP, is a well that has been abandoned and has no identifiable owner/operator.

Between 1859 and the 1980's (when registration became mandatory), thousands of wells were abandoned and there is no documentation to indicate their location.

The well bores cause health and physical hazards

- in streams (oil, acid, brine)
- in water wells (surface water, gas, acid, brine, sulfur)
- in buildings and mines (gas)
- in forest floor (large holes, oil spills)

This program has been a huge success but more volunteers are needed. Anyone of any age can volunteer and organized groups are welcome.

Training and equipment are provided.
